Judgement from the Court of Chancery 1842

A long dispute between the absentee vicar, Richard Boodle, and the Feoffees over payments for heating in the church and other matters, was finally settled by an action in the Court of Chancery in 1842. The whole dispute cost more than £500. The Court decided that the Feoffees could not

'spend moneys on the salary of the parish clerk, sacramental wine, winding the parish clock, fuel for the stove, expenses of the churchwardens at visitations. Funds should be devoted to repairing the church and its bells and ornaments and necessaries and to no other purposes.'
